Harry Helms Retires from Historical Society Board

Downingtown Area Historical Society member Harry Helms recently retired from the Society's Board of Directors. Harry, who is 93, had been on the Board for the last 20 years. He was born and raised in Upper Darby but graduated from West Catholic High School in Philadelphia in 1943. Following high school, Harry served in the Army for two and half years, after which he attended Villanova University on the G.I. Bill.

Harry worked for several companies following his graduation from college including Jayes Equipment, Westinghouse Electric, and Moore Products. Harry's expertise in automatic control equipment at Moore Products eventually led to a teaching position at Dobbins Technical School in Philadelphia. Then, in 1957, Harry came to Downingtown when he took a job with the Downingtown Paper Company as an instrument engineer.

Harry was married to his wife Jeanne for 64 years before she passed away in 2013. They had six children. Harry now lives in Freedom Village in West Brandywine.

We wish Harry all the best and again thank him for two decades of service to the Historical Society.

Names On A Bridge

Historical Society board members were discussing the temporary closure of the Lloyd Avenue bridge over Beaver Creek a few weeks ago when member Donna Capriotti mentioned she thought her father's initials, along with many others, were chiseled on the bridge's capstones. With the bridge out of service at the time, board members Mike Dunn and Jim Sundman decided to take a closer look to see what they could find. Chiseled on the capstones were not only the nickname of Donna's father, but many other locals as well, including a family of three that were identified with a little bit of detective work.

Lewis "Jiggs" Capriotti grew up on Bradford Avenue in the Johnsontown section of Downingtown. He was in the Navy during World War 2 and afterwards had a long career with the Downingtown Manufacturing Company. The photograph on the right shows Lewis with his father Bernardo and dog Brownie in 1942. Donna Capriotti isn't sure when her father chiseled his nickname on the bridge but she thinks it might have been done in the late 1940s.

A little bit of water helped make "Jiggs" more readable on a bright day.


These initials carved on the Lloyd Avenue Bridge in 1932 (right) got our attention, so we decided to do a little detective work to see if we could identify who they were. With all the names ending in 'R' we assumed they were from the same family, so we went to the Downingtown Census files. The Historical Society has an electronic database for the Borough for the Census years 1860 to 1940, so it was simply a matter of filtering the data until we (hopefully) got a hit.

First, we filtered the data so we only had the 1930 Census year which was the closest one to when these initials were carved. Second, we filtered the 1930 data for last names beginning with 'R.' Next, we filtered this data for all names beginning with 'H', 'M', and 'I'. And last, we looked for households that contained the same last name and had all three first names that began with these three letters. BINGO! Only one family remained.

It was the Ralston family who lived at 244 Highland Avenue, less than a mile from the bridge. HAR is Helen A. Ralston who was 11 in 1932. Helen was the daughter of Mabel A. Ralston (MAR) who was born in 1902, and Irvin L. Ralston (ILR) who was born in 1898.

Irvin died in 1973 and was a veteran of both World Wars. His wife Mabel died in 1978. Helen died in 1983.







The capstones on the Lloyd Avenue bridge over Beaver Creek are covered in carved names and initials, many from the 1930s and 1940s. Let us know if you have any idea who Joe and Dot are!





The Lloyd Avenue Bridge over Beaver Creek is County Bridge No. 286 and was built in 1919. Many of the names and initials carved in the bridge's capstones were done in the 1930s and 1940s. There was certainly much less traffic over the bridge back then than there is now!

Ashbridge Artifact



The **Crystal Spring Water Company** used a spring on Bradford Avenue to supply area homes with fresh water. John R. Johnson (for which Johnsontown is named) and Richard M. Boldridge (the owner of the Pennsylvania House Hotel) began the company in 1875. Here is one of the company's stock certificates from 1886.

Downingtown Did-You-Know?

Did you know that from October 29, 1989 to October 25, 1991 Amtrak operated its Metroliner service on weekdays from Downingtown to Washington, DC?

Metroliner service began under the Penn Central Railroad in 1969 and continued when Amtrak took over the Northeast Corridor in 1971. Metroliners service, which operated between New York City and Washington, DC, was generally targeted to business persons. Trains departed the respective cities on the hour during peak periods with some frequencies making the trip in as little as 2 ½ hours. Metroliners began to be phased out starting in 2000 when Amtrak's Acela service debuted. The last Metroliner ran in 2006.

The short-lived Downingtown Metroliner was probably geared to business persons on the Main Line who needed to be in the nation's capitol early in the morning. Oddly, there was no return Metroliner in the afternoon.




Downingtown Area Mystery Pic

This was another difficult mystery pic, but Walter Plank is truly a perceptive scholar because he was the first to identify the building under construction as the Downingtown Savings and Loan (now BB&T) on the corner of Pennsylvania and Manor Avenues. Nearly all the guesses were in the right area (as the old West Ward School in the background was an identifying feature), but most thought it was either St. Joseph's School on Pennsylvania Avenue or the old Post Office (now Priori Mattress) on Lancaster Avenue.
