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Train Passengers Invade Downingtown

On Monday, July 26, 1948, a bridge fire over railroad tracks in Eddington, Bucks County had a significant impact on Downingtown 50 miles away. The fire occurred on the Street Road bridge over the Pennsylvania Railroad's busy main line tracks which connected New York and Philadelphia. It took firefighters more than an hour to bring the fire under control by which time the intense heat dropped the electric lines that powered the trains onto the tracks below. Embers falling from the burning bridge also ignited the wooden ties. As a result, train traffic was completely halted.

Due to the fire, the Pennsylvania Railroad's crack passenger trains from New York to points west including Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis, and Detroit, had to bypass Philadelphia. When these trains reached Trenton, they were re-routed onto the PRR's Trenton Cut-Off to Glen Loch where they joined the Main Line to Pittsburgh. In order not to strand its Philadelphia passengers booked on these trains, the Pennsylvania Railroad shuttled them to Downingtown where they would get off and wait for their intended trains to the west.



Greenleaf Pharmacy was directly across West Lancaster Avenue from the Downingtown train station. The building is now the home of the Station Taproom.

Downingtown station agent Bob Peters had closed the station and gone home for the day when he got an urgent call to return to work. He hurried back to the station from his Brandywine Avenue home. His assistant Charlie Stahlnecker got a similar call and rushed back as well. As confused passengers got off the shuttles from Philadelphia, the two employees were needed to direct them to the Limiteds or to keep them informed as to when their train would arrive. At one point during the evening it was estimated that 1,500 passengers were in and around the station area.

Businesses by the Downingtown station never saw so many customers at once. As they waited for their trains, hungry passengers flocked to local grocery stores and restaurants including Cozzone's Soda Fountain, Roland's Café, and Mittel's Grocery Store. Greenleaf Pharmacy in particular, which was just steps from the station, was an exceptional draw with its soft drinks and ice cream.

PRR track crews repaired the damaged wires and tracks in Eddington by the end of the night, but by then all the re-routed Limiteds had arrived and departed Downingtown. The next day station agents Peters and Stahlnecker received a 'job well-done' by their superiors at the Railroad's headquarters in Philadelphia. And local businesses were counting what were probably record receipts. "Business was never so good," said Ray "Doc" Greenleaf.

In The (Old) News – Items that Made Headlines Back in the Day

1910 – In December, a man named John Anderson was traveling through Chester Springs looking for a warm place to stay. He approached West Pikeland Township's Constable Harry McBride and demanded McBride take him to the Chester County Home at Embreeville. McBride responded that he needed to be committed first, at which Anderson said, "Well, I'll be in the county home or jail before night." Anderson then found a hammer and broke windows of the Chester Springs Post Office and the hall of the Patriotic Order of the Sons of America. He was arrested was sentenced to fifteen days in a warm jail.

1924 [during Prohibition] – In May, a Chester County judge ruled that nine barrels of wine confiscated from Downingtown residents during raids must be returned to them. The owners claimed in court that when the wine was seized it was not intoxicating and therefore unlawfully taken. The court agreed and the wine was returned to Downingtown at the County's expense. However, the wine had sat in the basement for some time and by the time it was returned had begun to ferment, "every day adding to the strength of the fluid."

1928 – On August 2, two thousand potato farmers from the East Coast gathered near Downingtown for a two-day conference on growing and marketing potatoes.

Downingtown Vintage Ad

This advertisement for the Pennsylvania Railroad's electric service appeared in the January 13, 1938 issue of the Downingtown Archive. The Main Line was originally electrified to Paoli (in 1915) but in the mid-1930s the project was continued to Harrisburg. The first scheduled electric passenger service took place on January 15, 1938. The electrification project also included the PRR's low-grade freight line which went over the Trestle Bridge south of Downingtown.



Last Issue's Mystery Pic

Russ Faller is a truly perceptive scholar because he was the first person to identify the building on the right as the Lionville Fire Company's first firehouse. The image was taken in 1965 and appeared in the *Downingtown Archive* with the following description: "ORIGINAL FIRE HOUSE. Lionville Fire Company officials can't bring themselves to tear down the original quarters. It was replaced in 1929 by the present quarters, and stands forlornly in a field."
