What local folks were talking about 36 years ago

Noted below are news items originally published in the *East Branch Citizen* in the early part of October 1980:

• The Downingtown Area School District **teachers' strike**, which had begun on September 4, was settled on October 2, following contract negotiations conducted at the Chester County Courthouse. As a result, average teacher salary increased 11.5 percent the first year of the contract, and by 11 percent each, in the second and third years of the contract. The agreement also called for better vision care and prescription drug benefits.

• The fate of long-debated showing of **x-rated films** at the Cinema Arts Theatre in the Marchwood Shopping Center in Uwchlan Township rested in the hands of Chester County Judge D.T. Marrone. A coalition of Uwchlan residents opposed the screening of allegedly pornographic movies, and Bernard Hankin, developer and owner of the shopping center, filed suit in the Court of Common Pleas to stop the showing of the films. Hankin claimed that the lease to the theatre was sublet to Center Arts without his permission.

• The **Glen Moore Fire Co.** was considering the possibility of establishing a first aid squad. The discussion included a plan to buy a squad vehicle, similar to the one used by the East Brandywine Fire Co., but the squad would not provide ambulance transportation to a hospital. And Chuck Keesey, chief of the Glen Moore Fire Co., said only those who had successfully completed advanced first aid training courses would be allowed to give aid to victims until an ambulance crew from the Elverson Fire Co. or the Minquas Fire Co. arrived.

• **Cyclop** Gesseelschaft, German steel and plastic strapping manufacturer, purchased the FMC Corp. facility on Boot Road in East Caln. Following significant expansion and improvements, the facility is currently occupied by the **Chester County Intermediate Unit**.

• Members of **Cub Pack 23** who earned Webelos badges included Brian Gomez, Paul Butala, Jeff Young, Jeff Zeiders, Larry Bronson, Richard Wagner and Steve Lewis. And Eddie Schroeder received his Bear badge.

• DHS seniors, who were among the 16 high school students competing in the Chester County **Junior Miss Pageant**, included Jennifer Abrams, Maribeth Ficca, Beth Giffen and Suzanne Grant. Giffen, who played "Maple Leaf Rag" on the piano in the talent competition, was first runner-up.

• Officers of the Junior Methodist Youth Fellowship at **Hopewell United Methodist Church** included Mindy Kring, president; Wes Schroder, vice president; Nancy Landon, secretary; and Kim Matter, treasurer. And officers of the senior MYF group were Jimmy Small, president; Dave Cauley, vice president; Jacky Small, secretary; and Laura Wright, treasurer. Also, officers of the Twos couples group were Joe and Paula Wilson, presidents; Norm and Cindy Long, vice presidents; Dennis and Ruby Rettew, secretaries; Jim and Judy Schreiber, treasurers.

• The **DHS football team**—coached by head coach Ed Novak and assistants Ray DiSerafino, Jack Harrington and Ed Faulkner during the Downingtown School District teachers' strike—lost to West Chester East 14-6. Acting head coach Helen Finnegan's **DHS field hockey** squad stayed undefeated, as the Whippettes beat O.J. Roberts and Spring-Ford. Goalie Edie Robinson continued to be unscored upon. The **DHS girls' tennis team** was "doing a tremendous job under a difficult situation," claimed Walter Kottmeyer, acting coach, as the Whippettes beat O.J. Roberts 6-1. And Ed Spang, subbing for Coach Paul Hurley during the teachers' strike, said

the **DHS boys' soccer team** was "doing a real good job," as the Blue and Gold defeated Great Valley 3-1 and tied Coatesville 3-3.

Strasburg Road, West Bradford, \$59,900; 122 North Woodmont Drive, East Caln, \$125,000.

What was happening here in January 1930

Noted below are news items retrieved from the Downingtown Archive 86 years ago:

• Maurice Stiefel, owner of the **Roosevelt Theatre** on Brandywine Avenue in the borough, announced that Western Electric sound equipment had been installed in the movie house, enabling Downingtown area residents to hear film dialogue and music for the first time. The first "talkie" shown at the Roosevelt was "Hot for Paris," starring Victor McLaglen. That movie was banned by censors in Kansas until 800 feet of film, which included racy scenes and dialogue, were cut.

• The **Downingtown School Board** was considering several ways of coping with the increasing enrollment in the high school. Options discussed included building a new high school on the Manor Avenue site of the Downingtown Woman's Club or on a 10-acre site on Uwchlan Avenue, in an effort to locate the high school in an area that was beyond transportation and manufacturing "disturbances."

• A 15-ton flywheel inexplicably broke loose in the engine room of the **Bicking Paper Co.**, and hurtled through the roof of the plant. Although large chunks of the wheel broke several windows in nearby buildings and crushed an exterior wall of the Swan Hotel, no one was injured.

• Members of **Downingtown's Borough Council** were George Foreman, Frank Diffenderfer and James McGowan. Other borough officers included Chester Glisson, police chief, and Joseph Newlin, patrolman. Glisson's annual salary was \$2,100 and Newlin's was \$1,800. Willard McKinney was appointed chief of the Downingtown Fire Department.

• Officers of the **Alert Fire Co.** were Herbert Ash, president; Lewis Moses, vice president; Elmer Schrumpf, secretary; Arthur Glauner, financial secretary; Leland Wilson, treasurer; and William Mittel, trustee.

It's the Mill at Anselma in Chester Springs



Hilary Collins is a truly perceptive scholar because she was the first person to correctly identify the site in the photo above as the water-powered Mill at Anselma, which was built ca. 1747 to provide Chester Springs area residents with flour milling service. By the mid-19th Century, it supported the County's livestock and dairy economy by milling animal feed as well as flour. Oliver Collins, the last owner-miller, came to Anselma in 1919. He and his family continued to operate the grist mill and several other businesses at Anselma until 1982, when it was purchased by the French and Pickering Creeks Conservation Trust. What local people were talking about 36 years ago

Noted below are items originally published in the *East Branch Citizen* in the latter part of October 1980:

• The **Downingtown School District** approved the purchase of the Chemical Leaman Tank Lines' office building on Wallace Avenue in the borough for \$250,000. The building was to be used by the district's administrative staff, which had been housed for about 20 years in an annex of the high school on Manor Avenue. *(Editor's note: The Downingtown Library now occupies the building).*

• The Minquas and Uwchlan Ambulance Corps and the East Brandywine Fire Co. rescue squads each received \$2,000 from the proceeds of the second annual **Good Neighbor Day** road race on the Fourth of the July in Downingtown. More than 650 runners entered the 1980 race; there were 425 entrants in 1979.

• The **Exton-Lionville YMCA's** bid of \$87,000 resulted in its right to buy an 8.7-acre tract at Devon Drive and Whitord Road, which was owned by Uwchlan Township. The township bought the property in 1973 for \$65,000 as the possible site for a municipal building.

• DHS students who were semi-finalists in the **Merit Scholarship competition** were Allison Rabeneau, David Stockoff and Alison Hubler. Commended students in the competition included Sean Brown, Kimberly McCue, Brian Stockoff, Catherine Ross and Keith Huls.

• Michael Miller of the Minquas Fire Co and Brian Rambo of the Alert Fire Co. were named the Downingtown Fire Department's **Firefighters of the Year**.

• Wilson's Marsh Creek Inn on Route 282 in Glen Moore was offering a "complete lobster or prime rib dinner" on weekends for just \$9.95. And the **Black Angus Inn** was selling a filet mignon and king crab legs dinner for \$11.95

• The West Bradford Home and School Association's officers were Pam Foy, president; Mary Crouse, first vice president; Cathy Oles, second vice president; Joyce Fernald, secretary; and Kathy Murphy, treasurer. And officers of the Downingtown Elementary Home and School Association were Betty Busby, president; Jackie Bruton, first vice president; Cathy Bronson, second vice president; Carol Heacock, recording secretary; and Martha Broomall, corresponding secretary.

• Honored at the **Downingtown-Lionville Babe Ruth League** banquet were Tom Dooley, who received the Phil Burns Memorial trophy; Brad Halderman, the American League's MVP, and Joe DeMarco, National League MVP.

• Recent **property transfers** included: 406 Santillo Way, Uwchlan, \$82,350; 1642 Farnham Lane, West Bradford, \$67,865; 348 Washington Ave., Downingtown, \$82,500; 225 Karen Drive, Upper Uwchlan, \$53,900; 486 Fairview Road Wallace, \$66,650; 159 Appledore Drive, Caln, \$42,000; 103 Clearview Drive, East Brandywine, \$64,000.

• Down 14-0 at the half, the **DHS football team** scored twice against Spring-Ford after the intermission but the local gridders succumbed to the Rams, 21-12. Whippet TDs were scored on a 34-yard run by Teddy Robinson and an Eric Brammer pass to Bruce Tiller.

• The **DHS tennis team** finished its season with three wins—against Spring-Ford, Pottstown and Great Valley—to finish in fourth place in the Ches-Mont League with an 8-3 record. Coach Becky Desmond was especially pleased with leadership displayed by co-captains Melinda Horne, Kathy Gillooly and Vera Kockler.

• The **DHS soccer squad** qualified for the District I playoffs with a 9-3-2 record, the team's best mark since the soccer program was established. Coach Paul Hurley cited the play of Vince Forgione, Dale Russel, Dave DiEugenio, Kirt Kessler, Mike Pastino and Gary Johnson for much of the Whippets' success. After upsetting Lansdowne-Aldan 5-2, the local booters lost in the District I quarter final to Radnor, 2-0.

• Coach Sally Anderson's **DHS field hockey team** finished in fourth place in Ches-Mont action, with a 7-4 record. The Whippettes pulled a major upset when they defeated league-leading Boyertown by a 4-3 margin. Outstanding efforts by Edie Robinson, Fern Faller, Danine DiBernardi, Kelli Swartout, Julie Sten, Kim Kinney, Sherri Clayton, Sue Pease, Amy Horne, Natalie Koh, Sherri Sarmento and Jill Carbutt were cited by Anderson.

It's a fountain in Downingtown's Kerr Park



Chad McNeill is a truly perceptive scholar because he was the first person to correctly identify the location of the fountain in the photo above, which was taken by Robin Ashby. The now inoperative fountain was part of the concrete wall in Kerr Park, which includes a stairway into the park from the Lancaster Avenue bridge.

Here's a brief history of the park, including some information on the fountain, which was in the November 19, 2010 Hist-O-Gram: "Downingtown's Dr. Edward Kerr Memorial Park is one of the community's jewels. But few people realize the park's early development was one of the many private enterprises undertaken by the Downingtown Business Men's Club, forerunner of the Downingtown Area Chamber of Commerce. In 1927, a year after club members had underwritten the construction of Borough Hall, they decided that an overgrown, 45-acre area along Pennsylvania Avenue should be developed as a public park.

"Community leaders appointed in 1928 to a park commission to oversee the project were: Guyon Miller, chairman; Walter B. McIlvain, vice chairman; Ernest Smedley, treasurer; John Noll, secretary. Other members included: Mrs. E.B. Fisher, Frank Parke, Frank McGraw, Perry Tyson and Park Plank.

"The park was comprised of several tracts. Harbison-Walker donated 19 acres. Thomas Downing gave 11 acres. Eight acres were purchased from Mrs. Ella Roberts. Also, 5 acres were donated by the Downingtown Paper Co., and the Downingtown Iron Works contributed 2 acres. "One of the first projects was construction of tennis courts in 1929. Fish ponds and cinder walks were completed in 1931. A baseball diamond was built in 1932. A summertime play program, supervised by the School District, was established. The concrete entrance off Lancaster Avenue, funded during the Great Depression era by President Roosevelt's Works Progress Administration, was built in 1934.

"Initially funded by public subscription and contributions by the school district, in the early years, none of the projects and programs were supported by the Borough until 1935, when Borough Council appropriated \$1,500 for the upkeep of the park."

What was happening here 52 years ago

It was the Brooklyn Woolen Mill in Lyndell



Shelley Francies is a truly perceptive scholar because she was the first person to correctly identify the site in the early 20th Century photo above as the Brooklyn Woolen Mill. The mill was established by John McClure in 1844 in Brooklyn, the name of hamlet now known as Lyndell in East Brandywine Township. Despite its name, the mill primarily produced cotton goods. After Joseph McClure--who had earned a medical degree at Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia but never practiced medicine--joined the family firm, he expanded the business to include mills in nearby Milford Mills. After J. & J. Eastwood and Co. took over the business in 1890, the mill was producing between 9,000 and 14,000 yards of textiles weekly, according to Barbara Paul's "A History of East Brandywine Township." And in 1905, the Brooklyn Mill was converted into the Lyndell Paper Mill by Samuel Lemmon. The mill ceased operation in 1930. The mill site had been occupied by MacBrine's greenhouses until it closed in recent years.

What local folks were talking about 86 years ago

Noted below are news items which were published in April 1930 issues of the *Downingtown Archive*:

• A **new high school** was the primary focus when the Downingtown School Board held a special meeting to discuss the school district's needs over the next five years. At the time, borough students in the elementary grades were split between East Ward and West Ward schools. However, West Ward School also was where students in seventh through twelfth grades were enrolled, as well. Although the stock market had crashed in October 1929, the meeting attendees had no idea that the Great Depression would last for another 10 more calamitous years. The local school directors agreed that junior high school (seventh, eighth and ninth graders)

students should be located in the planned high school building because they could share the same library, cafeteria, auditorium, gymnasium and mechanical system. And a representative of the Department of Education in Harrisburg, who attended the meeting, strongly suggested that the school district should consider the increasing number of students from outside the borough, who would be enrolling in the borough schools.

• The Alert Fire Co. formed a building committee, which would be responsible for the constructing a new fire house on the former Thomas Pedrick property on the north side of West Lancaster Avenue, between Downing and Stuart Avenues, in the borough. The site had been purchased for \$3,500 in 1925. Members of the committee included Elmer Schrumpf, Leland Wilson, Arthur Glauner, William Barrett, Wilmer Johnson, W. I. Pollock, Josiah Phillips and William Mittel. *(Editor's Note: Building a fire station on the Pedrick site never reached fruition. Instead, the Alerts bought the Ringwalt estate on West Pennsylvania in 1940, and the fire house there was dedicated in 1941).*

• Elementary and secondary school choruses from the Downingtown District came in second in the **Chester County Singing Contest** at West Chester State College. About 80 pupils from Downingtown, under the guidance of Ruth Shumway, supervisor of music, participated in the competition. However, local folks were miffed with the judging of the Chester County Play Festival when the **DHS orchestra** didn't take first place in the competition.

• A. L. Allen, was hired to be the junior-senior high school's first director of the **physical education classes**, which were incorporated into the curriculum for the first time. Also, the School Board was seeking a site where the newly formed DHS **field hockey team** could practice and compete in matches. And DHS students were hoping that a **permanent band stand** would be built in the borough's Kerr Memorial Park so the high school band could play outdoor concerts there.

• On sale at **Gabriel's Fruit Market**, 121 W. Lancaster Ave., Downingtown, were two dozen bananas for 25 cents. And in addition to offering pick-up and delivery service, **Parke's Dry Cleaning and Dyeing**, 1 Wallace Avenue in the borough, offered special "mourning" service.

What was happening here 52 years ago

Noted below are news items originally published in local papers in the latter part of September 1964:

• The Downingtown Joint High School Board okayed plans for an **18-room addition to the high school**, which was built on Manor Avenue in 1960. The addition would increase the building's student capacity to 1,432; DHS enrollment in September 1964 was 727 pupils. Construction costs, plus some changes to the current building were projected to be \$1.2 million. The project was to begin in December 1964, and the anticipated completion date was January 1966.

• Downingtown became the site of the Chester County Redevelopment Authority's first Urban Renewal project. And **Donald Greenleaf** was appointed as the authority's executive director, a part-time position since he would continue to be Downingtown's assistant borough manager. The initial federal Urban Renewal project was to focus on the rejuvenation of 20 properties in the borough's business district.

• Joseph Mento, chairman of the **Downingtown Chamber of Commerce's** Christmas Lighting Committee, proposed that a "massive chandelier" be erected in the borough's Center Square as an organizational project. Mento also said the \$1,000 proceeds, generated via ad sales in the Chamber's business directory, plus private contributions, could cover the cost of the chandelier project. And Raymond Baugher, superintendent of schools, suggested that the \$1,000 worth of needed repairs to the Log House, where the Chamber had its office, might be accomplished by a group from DHS.

• **Downingtown School District teachers** who did graduate work at West Chester State College during the summer months included Edith Hille, Emily Lewis, Mary Costello, Glenda Bricker, Anne Siracuse, Elma Miller, Patricia Wentz, Barbara Miller, Emma Tweed, Eileen McCardell, Julia Pollock, Walter Millard, Michael Lipschultz, Charles Forte and John Rule.

• Officers of the Live Wire Class at **Downingtown Methodist Church** were Mrs. George Wagner, president; Elisabeth Carpenter, vice president; Mrs. Raymond Brookover, secretary; and Mrs. William Woodward, treasurer.

• Bibles were presented to Brenda Whitney, Barbara Martin, Robert Hodge, Larry Bickings, Libby Ekdahl, Jeffrey Sharp, Bonnie Hoxter and Michael Geddes when they were promoted to the Junior Department (seventh grade) of the Sunday School at **Marshallton Methodist** Church.

• Youngsters from Glenmoore who entered kindergarten at **Brandywine-Wallace Elementary School** included Dane Scott Colestock, Cynthia Lyn Comstock, John Wesley Gabriel, Patricia Ann Irey, Cynthia Gail Lewis, David Brian Lownes, Frank M. Styer and Judith Ann Wolfe. Their teacher was Elizabeth Wells. And officers of the school's PTA group were: Jay Lammey, president; Harry Martini, vice president; Mrs. Edward Ker, secretary; and Harry Yost, treasurer.

• Promoted to the Sunday School's third grade at **St. Paul's Lutheran Church**, Lionville, were Kimberly Fleck, Robin Nethery, Billy Hawk, Butch Hurst, Russel Miller, Glen Taylor, Peter Forsberg, Lisa Pfeiffer, Gary Maga, Darrell Regal and Cathy Shaw. Mrs. Alfred Kochel was their teacher.

• The **DHS football team** nipped Spring-Ford 13-7 in its season opener, as Tom Price scored two TDs on passes tossed by sophomore quarterback Bill Kline.

It was the demolition of the Pennsylvania House



Gregg Nelms was is a truly perceptive scholar because he was the first of many people who correctly identified the site in the photo above as the Pennsylvania House, on the south side of West Lancaster Avenue, in front of the railroad station in Downingtown. Henry Eicholtz took over the tavern he operated there in the 1840s, and expanded it into a railroad hotel, where train passengers could stay. The former hotel was turned into an apartment house in the 20th Century, as well as the location of several commercial establishments on the street level. The demolition was done in the early 1980s by the borough, after the building had been the scene of several fires, and a municipal parking lot was installed there. *Editor's note: Did you notice the black box attached to the utility pole in the photo above? That was one of the seven Gamewell System fire alarm boxes used by the Downingtown Fire Department until 1985. We'll have lots of info on the alarm system in next week's Hist-O-Gram.*

What local folks were talking about in May 1930

Noted below are news items originally published in the Downingtown Archive 86 years ago:

• Three young men burned to death when an airplane they were flying in **crashed to earth** at the Lewis Downing farm on Bell Tavern Road in East Caln. The plane was owned and piloted by one of the victims, Carmen Van Leer of Glen Loch. The other victims were Norman Donnelly of West Chester, and Robert Stanford of Glen Loch. Downingtown firemen and the Minquas ambulance responded to the crash site, to no avail.

• Based on the 1930 federal census, the population of the borough of Downingtown had grown from 4,024 in 1920 to 4,544 a decade later.

• The Downingtown Park Commission decided to pay W.I. Pollock \$1 per square yard for the removal of an island in the middle of Brandywine Creek. The island had contributed to flooding in **Kerr Park**. Tennis courts had been installed in the park recently, and the commission planned to build a baseball diamond and field hockey field there.

• Downingtown **Police Chief** Chester Glisson said he wouldn't tolerate borough residents parking their cars in the street overnight, in order to avoid paying rent for a garage space.

• The American Legion's plans for **Memorial Day** included the firing squad and trumpeters participating in an 8:30 AM gravesite service at St. Joseph's Cemetery. Then the Legionnaires met the Coatesville Drum and Bugle Corps at St. Joseph's Catholic Church in the Johnsontown section of the borough, and they all marched to the Eachus Feed Mill at the intersection of Viaduct and West Lancaster Avenues, where a parade formed. In addition to members of the American Legion and the drum and bugle corps, the parade, included the veterans of the Civil War (GAR Post), the Spanish-American War, World War I, Boy and Girl Scout Troops, local school children, and the DHS band. The band route was limited to several streets in the west end of town, before the line of march ended at the Lancaster Avenue bridge, where there was an exercise to honor servicemen who were lost at sea. The final stop was a gravesite service at Northwood Cemetery.

• A **May Day Festival** was conducted on the grounds of East Ward School in the borough. The program began with the high school band and a large number of DHS students parading down Lancaster Avenue to the elementary school. Sara Diffenderfer was crowned May Queen. Each class performed May pole dances, songs and pantomimes.

• Mrs. Walter McIlvain gifted new Linotile flooring for the chancel and sanctuary of **St.** James Episcopal Church in Downingtown. The color scheme was cream and black, to match the church's walls and pews.

• The Gulf Refining Co. had opened a **gas station** at the corner of East Lancaster Avenue and Green Street in Downingtown.

• Downingtown women who **earned bachelor's degrees** from West Chester State Teachers College were Anna Murray, Martha Brown, Kathryn Brown, Emily Lewis and Martha Larkin.

• **Dick Thomas** had begun selling "real barbecue" at his shop on Lincoln Highway in the Whitford area.

Noted below are news items originally published in local papers in the latter part of March 1948:

What local folks were talking about in May 1930

Noted below are news items originally published in the *Downingtown Archive* 86 years ago:

• The **Roosevelt Theatre** on Brandywine Avenue, Downingtown, had begun giving Personal Beauty Ware pieces to women who attended a movie on a Wednesday or Thursday night. The free pieces included a dressing comb, brush, mirror and "all the necessary manicuring and toilette articles for the lady's boudoir."

• **Samuel Banghart**, an 85-year-old Civil War veteran participated in the Downingtown's Memorial Day parade, as the last surviving member of the local GAR Post, which he had founded. He enlisted in the Union Army as a drummer boy when he was 16, and subsequently served as an infantryman until 1865.

• Many local residents only had to pay \$3.50 to take advantage all summer of the recreational activities offered by the **YMCA Camp**, located just south of the borough border. The camp included six two-story cottages and six bungalows, both of which had electric lights; the weekly rate for lodging was \$7, excluding meals. There also was a cement, outdoor swimming pool and a bathhouse, four tennis courts, and a recreation hall. Also, Camp Dwight, for boys between 11 and 16, and Camp Castle, for young kids, were Additional facilities opened for the first time.

• In addition to shoe repairs, **Joseph Mfauewd** offered cleaning and blocking of hats at his shop at 114 E. Lancaster Avenue.

• An altar frontal, designed by parishioner Gilbert McIlvaine and executed by a firm in London, was presented by Mr. and Mrs. Noll in memory of their daughter, Ruth, to **St. James Episcopal Church** in Downingtown. And proceeds from several performances of an operetta, starring St. James members, were used to pay for painting of the parish house's interior.

• The **Downingtown Rotary Club** established a foundation to help worthy DHS grads pay for their college education.

• Members of **St. Anthony's Lodge** and their families in Downingtown celebrated St. Anthony's Day by having an Italian band from South Philadelphia play several concerts over the weekend in the Johnsontown section of the borough, and enjoyed a fireworks display on Saturday night.

• The grand prize at the Minquas Fire Co. carnival was \$100 in gold.

• Mrs. A. Lee Miller opened the **Brandywine Tea Room** at 103 Brandywine Ave. in the borough. Another new eating establishments was J. F. McInerney's White **House Inn**, on Route 30 in the Whitford area.

Pat Butler explains how Fire Department's alarm system worked

When Pat Butler, longtime firefighter for the Alerts, saw the photo of the Pennsylvania House demolition in the October 20 Hist-O-Gram, he immediately noticed the Gamewell fire alarm box attached to a utility pole in the picture. The Downingtown Fire Department used the Gamewell system from the late 1920s until 1985.

In addition to the one in front of the Pennsylvania House, the alarm boxes also were located in the 1960s and 1970s at Center Square (intersection of Lancaster and Brandywine Avenues), old St Joseph's Catholic School and Beaver Creek School on West Pennsylvania Avenue, the junior high school (now the STEM Academy) and the senior high school on Manor Avenue, and East Ward School on East Lancaster Avenue.

Pat explained how that alarm system worked in an email to the Historical Society:

If someone activated the alarm, a loud bell would sound at each fire station in town, in addition to the horns at Borough Hall.

Pat now owns the box that had been in front of the old St Joseph's Catholic School. That was Box 312. So when someone pulled that alarm, it was activated and the bells at both fire houses in town would sequentially ring 3 times, 1 time and 2 times. The same sequence would be heard



throughout town from the horns at Borough Hall.

The photo on the left shows what the system, installed at each fire house, looked light; several cog wheels in that box activated the horns and bells at each firehouse.

And if there was a general alarm, someone would activate one of the Gamewell systems at either fire house with a 7, which would blow the horns in 7 bursts (and would repeat 2 more times.) If the alarm signaled a call to the Alert Fire Co., the signal would be a 13 sequence (one burst followed by three bursts), while a signal to the Minquas Fire Co. would be a 12 (one burst, followed by two bursts).

Also an alarm for an air raid would be continuously blasting of the horns at Borough Hall.

What was happening here 36 years ago

Noted below are news items originally published in the *East Branch Citizen* in the early part of November 1980:

Little League field became site of first St. Joe's School



Anthony D'Addezio is a truly perceptive scholar because he was the first person to correctly identify the site in the photo above as the former Little League field in Downingtown in the early 1950s. The cars are parked along West Pennsylvania Avenue, just west of Manor Avenue, and the outfield fence ran along the alley, between Lancaster and Pennsylvania Avenues. Also, that's the West Ward School on the south side West Lancaster Avenue (1910-1958) on the upper part of the photo, and part of the original Messiah Lutheran Church is on the upper left side of the picture. However, the north side of West Lancaster Avenue was still undeveloped at that point. The property became the location of the first St. Joseph's Catholic School, which opened in 1954, and a new Little League diamond was built on Manor Avenue. The former parochial school was the location of the Regina Luminis Academy for about a decade, until it recently moved to the Norristown area. However, part of the former school is now occupied by Brandywine Grace Church, and several homes were built on the property near the intersection with Manor Avenue in 1991.

What local folks were talking about in October 1964

Noted below are news items originally published in local papers 52 years ago:

• The Downingtown Joint Elementary School Board was advised by an architectural consultant that the **East Ward School**, which was built nearly 50 years earlier, was structurally sound and it could be used for 10 more years, after some minor repairs were made. The school directors also decided not to pursue a major renovation at the school, which would cost about \$100,000, in order to meet state requirements. Instead, they planned to eventually build a 24-room school on neighboring property, to replace the original East Ward School.

• The board of trustees at **Central Presbyterian Church**, Downingtown, signed an agreement of sale to purchase the property of John and Wilmer Scott on the east side of Uwchlan Avenue, at the intersection of Pennsylvania Avenue, where a new church would be built in the borough. The new church was needed because the congregation had doubled over the past 10 years, and that growth pace was projected to continue. The 4.7-acre site, which cost \$42,750, was nine times larger than the original church property at 216 East Lancaster Avenue, currently the location of the Dane Décor furniture store. Fundraising by the 600 member-congregation over for 10-years was expected to cover the \$500,000 overall cost of the project.

The church was organized in 1861, with 15 charter members. Services were initially conducted for three years on the third floor in a building known as Mullin's Hall, at 119 East Lancaster Avenue. The original church was built for \$5,200 during the Civil War period, and was dedicated on September 1, 1864. Land on which it was constructed was donated by Jacob Parke, a member of the Society of Friends, and Silas Yerkes, a charter member. And the original parsonage on Washington Avenue was built for \$2,300 on land donated by A. P. Tutton.

What was happening here 67 years ago

Noted below are news items originally published in local papers in the latter part of March 1949:

• The borough's School Board met with school directors from seven neighboring township school systems and county and state school officials, in an effort to solve the **overcrowding** at Downingtown Junior-Senior High School (now the STEM Academy). The borough's secondary school on Manor Avenue satisfied the needs of youngsters who lived in Downingtown, noted Charles Emery, the borough district's supervising principal (superintendent). However, the plant and staff at the junior-senior high school in the borough would not be able to adequately serve all the students, when the number from the outlying communities continued to grow at a fast pace. Also, increasing the size of the current junior-senior high school, to accommodate more pupils—including the immediate need for eight more classrooms and two industrial arts shops—would cost \$300,000, said George Nixdorf, president of the Downingtown School Board. That expense, and meeting the needs of inevitable enrollment growth in the near future, could only be accomplished by consolidation of the school districts in nearby rural townships with the borough school system, concluded the school officials at the meeting.

• Martin Binder, former fire chief, explained how the Downingtown Fire Department's new, **two-way radio system** was set up. It included two portable units on two of the fire companies' trucks, and a base station, including a 108-foot tall antenna, at the Alert's fire station. Cost of the system was to be shared by both companies.

• Two-year-old **Johnny Walls**, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Walls, Downingtown, owed his life to the efforts of family physician Dr. Martin Neff, Minquas ambulance driver Frank Baen and two volunteers, who worked on the boy for about 45 minutes, after he had a seizure. Dr. Neff said the resuscitator on the ambulance played a critical role in saving the child's life.

• Featured at Downingtown Junior-Senior High School's annual **music recital** were a vocal quartet comprised of John Shisler, James Zaferes, Gordon Carpenter and Ronald Hogg; and a clarinet quartette that included Louise Bartelmo, Margaret Sciarretta, Barbara Seibert and Joseph Streamer. Instrumentalists who performed solos were Robert Hughes, saxophone; Marvin Frederick, trombone; John Windle, drums; and Annabelle Warnick flute.

• Wallace Township residents who collected funds for the **Red Cross** included Mrs. William Rigg, Mrs. Noah Sensenig, Mrs. John Adams, Olive Williams, David Johnson, Joaquin Matlack, David Grimes, Grier Miller, Kenneth Comstock, William Harrop, Joseph Mason and Ralph Hannum.

• Elected as directors of the **Downingtown Rotary Club** were Herbert Ash, C.O. Brown, Jack Brownstein, Ernest Smedley, Ralph Lineinger, Samuel Evans and George Aumiller.

• A Downingtown man, who had married a Louisiana woman while he was serving on a U.S. Navy base near New Orleans during World War II, was granted a divorce in Chester County Court on grounds of desertion. The ex-sailor told Judge W. Butler Windle that when he had proposed that his wife should come back to Downingtown to live with him, she retorted, "You are not sticking me in any hick town."

• Elected during the annual re-organization of **Fairview Presbyterian Church**, Glen Moore, were Theodore Baumgard, president; Thomas Millard, secretary; George Crosby, treasurer; and Jacob Shoemaker, cemetery superintendent.

• Officers elected to lead the Lionville-based Twin Valley **4-H Club** were Meredith Ruark, president; George Ruark, vice president; Carl Ruth, secretary-treasurer; and Gwen Hamer, program chairman. Peggy LaRose, and Shirley and Elinor Matlack were new members.

• Girls who joined a newly formed **Brownie troop in Marshallton** included Pat and Lynn Klunder, June Brackbill, Barbara Busby, Anna Sheets, Kathleen Hall, Susie McCue, Ann Jefferis, Emily Lambert, Barbara Durnall and Jean Edwards. Leaders of the troop were Mrs. Edward McCue and Mrs. H. S. Geisel.

• Newly elected officers of the **Downingtown VFW Post** were William Wilmot, commander; Ralph Howard, senior vice commander; Jack Farrell, junior vice commander; Walter Touchton, quartermaster; Walter Hadfield, chaplain; and Marshall Deputy, John Rogers and James Fennelly, trustees. And elected to lead the **VFW Post's auxiliary** were Louise Ayers, president; Mrs. Earl Parker, senior vice president; Mrs. Henry Thomas, junior vice president; Mrs. William Reed, treasurer; Kathryn Ceulers, chaplain; and Mrs. Walter Hadfield, trustee.

It's the Uwchlan Friends Meeting House



Not one soul correctly identified the site in this 1902 photo of the Uwchlan Friends Meeting House, on Route 113 in Lionville, which was built in 1756. The Uwchlan Friends Meeting was established in 1714. During the Revolutionary War, a Continental Army hospital was established at nearby Yellow Springs, but when that facility was overwhelmed with sick and wounded soldiers in 1778, the meeting house was commandeered by military physicians and converted into a military hospital. Beginning in 1904, Lionville High School used the meeting house for classes until 1932, when the high school closed. Subsequently, the building was occupied by Lionville Elementary School, until 1960. The Uwchlan Grange, which had been meeting in the building since 1906, purchased the property in 1920. However, the graveyard continued to be owned by the Friends Meeting. The Woman's Community Club of Uwchlan, which was formed in 1922, took ownership of the meeting house in 1963. It was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1973. In 1976, the building was sold to the Uwchlan Conservation Trust, but the Community Club continues to use the building for its clubhouse and manages rentals

What local folks were talking about 86 years ago

Noted below are items originally published in the *Downingtown Archive* in the summer of 1930:

• Trustees of the **Minquas Fire Co.** bought its adjoining property on East Lancaster Avenue in the borough, formerly the garage and offices of the Downingtown Motor Co., for \$20,000. In addition to enabling the Minquas to expand its operation when needed, several members of the fire company talked about the option of constructing a community swimming pool inside the newly acquired building. In the fall of 1929, the fire company had installed bowling alleys to be used by the community, and a gymnasium on the second floor of the fire house, where the DHS boys' and girls' basketball teams practiced and played home games.

• Several **golf businesses** were opened in the Downingtown area. A miniature course was installed on the Bell Tavern property on Route 30 in East Caln, where players paid 35 cents for a round at night and 25 cents during the day. Also, golfers could practice—50 cents for 50 balls— on a driving range that was opened on the Howard Trego farm on Route 30 in the Gallagherville section of Caln. And a miniature golf course was opened on the Swan Hotel property on Brandywine Avenue in Downingtown.

What local folks were talking about 36 years ago

Noted below are items published in the East Branch Citizen in the latter part of November 1980:

• Vernon "Zeke" Osborne was named chief of the Downingtown Police Department. Osborne, a 29-year veteran on the 12-officer force, replaced Lewis Wilson, who had retired in February 1980.

• Representatives of the **Downingtown Historical Society** presented a \$1,200 check to Downingtown's Borough Council. All told, the organization contributed \$10,800 to underwrite the borough history being written by Jane Davidson. The history was published in 1982.

• Officers elected to lead the Christian Endeavor primary group at **Windsor Baptist Church**, Eagle, were Tara Trego, president; Bill Weber, vice president; and Jason Trego, secretary-treasurer. Members of the nominating committee included Jim Runyen, Libby Hughes, Florence Krisch, Charles Popjoy and Adell Anthony.

• Elected to the **Lionville Youth Association** board were Don Wix, Otto Preikszas, Norm McQuillin, Fred Costello, John Bertram, Rich Evangelista, Tim Carrol and Tom Cliggett.

• Once again, sophomore kicker Brad Novak booted a field goal in the waning seconds of a game, as the **DHS football squad** beat Pottstown 16-14. The deciding three-pointer was set up when defensive end Chet Eagles blocked a Pottstown punt and carried the ball to the Trojan 15-yard line. Teddy Robinson was the Whippets' leading rusher, with 139 yards on 26 carries.

• The Downingtown **Young Whippets**' 75-pound team, coached by George Murphy, Dennis Myers, Wes Pannebaker, Skip Weiss and George Wolf, won the Bert Bell Conference title by beating the Brandywine Youth Club 13-0.

• Recent **property transfers** included: 317 Huffman Drive, Exton, \$87,500; 123 Taylors Mill Road, Uwchlan, \$76,665; 8 Waterview Road, Upper Uwchlan, \$73,000; 612 Pancoast Lane, East Brandywine, \$91,525; 1640 Farnham Lane, West Bradford, \$63,122; 243 Prospect Avenue, Downingtown, \$46,700; 117 Argyll Court, Thorndale, \$45,000.

• **Daniel Lyons**, a Lionville volunteer firefighter, participated in the rescue efforts at the MGM Grand Hotel fire in Las Vegas, which took 80 lives. Lyons was attending a business convention at Caesar's Palace across street. After he showed Las Vegas Fire Department officials documents that he was a trained firefighter and ambulance corpsman, he became part of the rescue operation.

• **Randy Treer** dove into the Ohio River in Cincinnati and rescued a man whose car had plunged into the river. The car's driver went under water twice before Treer saved him. Treer had just completed a 10-hour drive from his family's home in Lionville to Cincinnati, where he was pursuing a degree at the University of Cincinnati.

• Coatesville Hospital announced plans to relocate as soon as December 1981, to the new **Brandywine Hospital** on Reeceville in Caln.

• Downingtown Junior High School pupils, who placed ninth in team competition at the National Conference of **Industrial Arts Students** in Gatlinburg, TN, included John Sciandra, Eileen Ferris, Lou Cippolini, Asit Upadyay, Diane Sanner and Steve Foster.

• The real estate firm of Porter and Painter listed the **Downingtown United Methodist Church** on Brandywine Avenue for sale. The original part of church was constructed in 1899. The asking price was \$125,000.

What was happening here 86 years ago

Noted below are items originally published in the Downingtown Archive in October of 1930:

• In an article about an upcoming **Downingtown School Board** meeting, where borough residents could express their recommendations regarding the local school district's current facilities and curriculum, the newspaper noted: "The local high school supports very little beyond the academic courses, and in a cosmopolitan population like Downingtown it will not require much argument to convince anyone that domestic science courses and vocational courses are essential because the number of people that can profit by the studies of Latin, French, mathematics, etc. are few, compared to those who could be helped by domestic science, vocational and manual courses."

• The intersection of Routes 100 and 30, now known as the **Exton Crossroads**, was beginning to bustle with several new businesses. They included Daniel Barbour's Sunoco gas station, R.W. Thomas's Junction Garage, Hatton's Exton Lodge, and M.H. Reese's Valley Creek Coffee House.

• **Downingtown's Park Commission** collected \$430. 50 in its fundraising campaign, so trees (costing \$2.50 and \$1.50) and shrubs (50 cents) could be purchased and planted in Kerr Memorial Park.

• **Miniature golf** continued to boom in the borough. • The **DHS football team** "humbled" Phoenixville 18-0 in its season opener. The Blue and Gold tallied its first TD when Morris Yohn intercepted a pass and 40 yards to the end zone. Charles Horning tossed a 25-yard pass to Clarence Myers for the second Papertowners' score. And Joe Sciaretta's 30 yard run for a score in the fourth quarter ensured a victory.

It's the barn at Glen Isle Farm



Rahn Brackin is a truly perceptive scholar because he was the only person who correctly identified the building in the photo above as the barn at Glen Isle Farm. Currently, the property is the location of the Orangery Restaurant, 130 South Lloyd Ave., Downingtown. The Italian BYO restaurant is owned and operated by Paul and Sabrina Lutz. The photo of the barn, was taken by Roy D'Ginto of Downingtown in 1987, before significant deterioration occurred. First opened as a tavern in 1735; the establishment was called "The Ship" in 1764. George Washington visited there, according to his diary entry for June 3, 1773. After British soldiers shot bullets into the tavern's wooden sign during the Revolutionary War, the business was moved to the Lancaster Pike and Ship Road in Exton in 1795. During the Civil War, the home at Glen Isle was a "safe house" on the Underground Railroad.

This was NOT the Uwchlan Friends Meeting House



Now it's time for us to eat some crow. Rahn Brackin, the same person who is a truly perceptive scholar because he correctly identified the photo of the barn at Glen Isle Farm, as noted on the previous page, also informed us that the photo above is not the Uwchlan Friends Meeting House, which we claimed in last week's Hist-O-Gram. We made that assumption because the 1902 photo donated to us years ago included the hand-written notation "Meeting House." And yes, we knew that the Uwchlan Meeting House, built in 1756, was constructed of stone. However, we unwisely suspected the stone exterior walls could have been covered with stucco, which was commonplace during the 19th Century. Well, we were wrong. Rahn says the building in the photo above actually was the Bell School, which was located on Bell Tavern Road, near Route 30, in East Caln. Several decades after the school was closed in 1924, the building became part of the D'Ambrosio car dealership, which has since been relocated further east on Route 30. And the school's former site is now occupied by the Wawa convenience store. Perplexing about the Bell School's identity, however, is the fact that there's another vintage photo of the school, in the Chester County Historical Society's photo archive, shows a building that was octagonal and had a cupola-like structure on top. It didn't look at all like the plain, quadrangular building in the photo above.

What local folks were talking about 36 years ago

Noted below are items published in the *East Branch Citizen* in the early part of December 1980:

• West Bradford Township supervisors were considering disposing of septic tank waste (95% water ,which would replenish ground water in the area) on the Highland Orchards property, if the state Department of Environmental Resources approved of the plan. Bob Hodge, owner of the orchard, said the procedure had been "an accepted practice for a long time."

• The Downingtown School District's **running population census** was better than the federal census, claimed Superintendent Charles Micken, because "we add good hard data every working day. We have a file card for everyone in the district." Sources of population data included realtors, apartment house owners and operators, school registration figures, local municipalities' housing officers, the county planning commission, the PA Economy League, plus the federal census. Downingtown school officials need constantly updated census data to project needs for staff, teachers, classrooms and equipment, noted Micken.

• Recent **property transfers** included: 43 Hunt Club Lane, West Pikeland, \$102,700; 404 Santillo Way, Uwchlan, \$81,165; 1105 Vermont Lane, West Bradford, \$48,855; 125 Governors Circle, East Brandywine, \$84,100; 164 Whiteland Hunt Road, West Whiteland, \$97,500; 211 Meadow Drive, Thorndale, \$59,500.

Historic bridge in borough to be upgraded

PennDOT representatives recently provided Downingtown Borough Council with an overview of expected renovations to the Lancaster Avenue bridge over the Brandywine, according to the *Downingtown News*, the borough's online newsletter. PennDOT project manager Michael Cutty said the bridge is in "poor" condition, but there is no need at this time for emergency repairs.

Cutty also noted that the bridge, built in 1921, is not on a historic registry of bridges or in a historic section of the borough. However, he said PennDOT recognizes the historic significance of the bridge and, will maintain the architectural design of the bridge. He anticipates a 2018 (at the earliest) start date. The new bridge will feature a 1-foot high curb with metal elements to separate the road from the sidewalk--a PennDOT requirement for all new bridges with pedestrian access. During renovations, it is expected that one lane of traffic will be allowed over the bridge. Traffic patterns will be determined at a later date.

Mile Marker is now in front of Historical Society



Tommy Lee is a truly perceptive scholar because he was the first person to correctly tell us that the historic mile marker in the photo above is currently located in front of Ashbridge House, the Historical Society's 307-year-old headquarters on Route 30, in the front of the Ashbridge Square Shopping Center. The letters and numbers incised on the granite tombstone-shaped marker were used on the 1795 Philadelphia and Lancaster Turnpike, the first, long-distance, toll road built in the United States. The "29 M" and the "P" chiseled into the marker show that stone was 29 miles west of the Market Street Bridge, at 30th Street in Philadelphia.

What was happening here 67 years ago

Noted below are news items originally published in local papers in the early part of April 1949:

• **Pepperidge Farm Inc.** of Norwalk, CT, opened an employment office on West Lancaster Avenue in Downingtown and was beginning to hire people to work in its bakery to be opened in May in the former Acorn Iron building on Chestnut Street in the borough. Local people who had begun training in Norwalk before working in the Downingtown plant included Arthur Hoopes, and Rose Colella.

• Over 300 spectators turned out at Kerr Park for the third annual **Marble Tournament**, which was sponsored by the Downingtown Young Men's Association. Some 125 boys and girls participated. John Fusco, a sixth grader, won the first place trophy, and his brother, Steven, a third grader, came in second. Eighth grader William Tipton was third, and first grader Larry Dague was given an honorable mention. Other grade level winners included James DiBerardinis, second grade; Richard Keers, fourth grade; and seventh grader Herbert Lee.

• Residents in the Downingtown neighborhood of **Central Presbyterian Church** (now Dane Décor) enjoyed hearing hymns amplified on a recorder from the church tower every evening at sundown. But when the recorder developed a glitch and many East Ward residents were roused from their sleep when the music kicked in at 2 AM, they called the borough police.

• And music created another local problem, momentarily, when it appeared that there would not be enough **housing** provided by Downingtown area citizens for the 130 visiting high school musicians from the Philadelphia suburbs, who were expected to practice together for two days before playing in the Southeastern Pennsylvania District band concert at the auditorium of the junior-senior high school.

• The Downingtown Chamber of Commerce reported that it would cost between \$1,700 and \$2,000 to have a 4-feet x 6-feet, bronze marker with all the names of local service men listed as the **World War II Plaque** to be installed at the triangle at Kerr Park.

• The **Chester Valley Rebekah Lodge** was established in Lionville. Charter officers were Grace Benner, noble grand; Anna Wilson, vice grand; Elizabeth Stinson, recording secretary; Eva Wheatley, financial secretary; Dorothy Lambert, treasurer; Edna Windle, noble grand's right supporter; Mary Lou Ross, noble grand's left supporter; Gladys Blake, warden; Mary Funderwhite, inside guardian; and Alice Locke, outside guardian.

• Members of **Cub Pack 52, Marshallton**, who participated in several activities were Barry Wickersham, Woody Bossert, Alan Miller, Richard Busby, Larry and David Hoffman, Kenneth and Charles Brooks, Everett and Russell Ramsay, Donald Lambert, Ralph Hall and Charles Bunting. And **Boy Scouts from Lionville** who spent two days at camping at Valley Hill were Dick Stoudt, Ronny Otter, Tommy Fisher, Carl Ruth, Harry Dewees, and George and Meredith Ruark.

• Richard Warren was elected president of the **Downingtown Rotary Club**. Other officers were Ernest Smedley, vice president; George Aumiller, secretary; and Herbert Ash, treasurer.

• Installed as officers of the **Downingtown VFW Post** were William Wilmot, commander; Ralph Howard, senior vice commander; Jack Farrell, junior vice commander; Walter Touchton, quartermaster; Walter Hadfield, chaplain; and directors Marshall Deputy, John Rogers and James Fennelly.

What local folks were talking about 52 years ago

Noted below are items published in local newspapers in the latter part of October 1964:

• The new **report card system**, used by the junior and senior high schools, prompted a lengthy discussion at a Downingtown Joint High School Board meeting. The new report card consisted of several color sheets and a cardboard back which ultimately became the permanent record. By using carbon paper, one colored sheet was sent to parents at home, and another sheet could be used as a mid-term failure warning system to notify parents that their child was not working up to their capability. Lowering a passing grade to a 60 also was a point of interest.

• More than 250 residents of **West Pikeland Township** petitioned for the repeal of the controversial state law, Act 299, which required consolidated of small school districts. The petition signers claimed that implementation of merger law would increase taxes by 50 percent.

• Members of the cast in the **DHS Senior Class play**, "Arsenic and Old Lace," included Janet Strawsnyder, Robert Bruton, Gene Martin, Edwin Conner, Lex Jervis, Peggy Woodland, Barbara Booth, Kris Yeaworth, James Sanders, Edward Hiltebeitel, Geoffrey Roehrs, Carl Harper and William Berndt.

• Edwin Smedley was installed as Master of the **Uwchlan Grange**. Also officers installed were Elroy Butterman, overseer; George Taylor, lecturer; Edith Oberholser, chaplain; Joseph Kester, steward; Jonathan Styer, assistant steward; Gilbert Smedley, treasurer; Isabel Acker, treasurer; and Hazel Smedley, gatekeeper.

• The Ladies Auxiliary of the **East Brandywine Fire Co.**, appointed to a nominating committee were Peg Frazer, Myra Thomas and Nickie Anderson. Members of the audit committee included Helen Frazer, Beverly Williams and Mardette Cumens.

• Gold watches were presented to Bud Steffy, Dan Zittle, George Quinn and Ashton Lammey because they had signed up at least 12 new members of the Downingtown **Moose Lodge.**

• Elected to lead the Parents Group of the new **Pickering Valley School** were James McClung, president; Mrs. James Martin, vice president; and Cora Miller, treasurer.

• New members of the board of the **Whitford Country Club** were Carl Bucks, A. N. Gustafson, Dale Hartsell, Trimble Kent, Hugh Kenworthy, Robert Kistler and Ilario Polite.

• Responses to a survey of **Wallace Township** residents, completed as part of the development of a comprehensive plan, determined that: 47 percent of them wanted to keep the township rural.

• Placekicker Roy Nellius booted two extra points, and that made the difference as the **DHS football team** beat Pottstown 13-12 before a Homecoming crowd. The two Whippet scores came via a pass from quarterback Bill Kline to Bob Poole and a 2-yard plunge into the end zone by Nellius.

The building sits nestled along the banks of the East Branch of the Brandywine Creek which provided the water needed to turn a waterwheel, which in turn powered a large shaft and gears.

As Downingtown grew and evolved into the family-friendly dining and shopping district, production at the paper mill slowed and in 2001, it closed its doors. It was purchased by investors in 2004, and was renovated and reopened as a restaurant in 2009. During the renovation, the developers preserved the historical integrity of the building. Today, the open rafters display the original pulley system, the bull wheels at the front and back of the restaurant, and the 176-foot tall chimney, which still stands in the parking lot.

Milito's Ristorante—which serves only the best, fresh, Italian food, homemade desserts, and signature cocktails—is owned and operated by Joe and Leslie Milito. The traditional Italian dishes leave guests feeling as if they had just been swept away on a whirlwind tour of Italy. While the artful plating and creative recipes by Executive Chef James Brunner keeps them coming back for more.

What local folks were talking about 52 years ago

Noted below are items published in local newspapers in the early part of November 1964:

• The **Downingtown Farmers Market**, on Route 30 in East Caln, was celebrating its 12th anniversary. Back in 1952, when the market had its grand opening, cars trying to reach the market were lined up for three miles to the west, as far away as Thorndale, and for a comparable distance to the east, to Exton.

• The Downingtown Area School Board reviewed plans for a macadam **ice skating rink** to be installed at Lionville Elementary School. The school's PTA, which had proposed the rink, raised \$600 to help pay for its construction.

• Winners of a **political slogan contest**, conducted in the Problems of Democracy classes at DHS, included: Connie Webster, first prize—"Peace, not pieces…Vote Democratic," and James Clark, second prize—"Remember the Alamo: The Texans made a mess of that, too."

• Members of **Boy Scout Troop 23**, sponsored by Central Presbyterian Church, who were promoted at a Court of Honor included: Tom Hickey, life; John Nixdorf, star; Mike McCardell, Chuck Mitman and Palmer Raysor, first class; Doug Mecray, Brian Ricci, David Ratcliff, Douglas Kiernan and Frank Bishop, second class; and William Stevens, tenderfoot.

• Although the **Whippet offensive line** was outweighed by an average of 30 pounds per man, compared to O.J. Roberts' linemen, they provided DHS quarterback Bill Kline enough time to toss three touchdown passes, as Downingtown beat the Wildcats 21-6. And the defensive line bottled up the Bucktowners' ground attack and forced several interceptions and fumbles. Oscar Asparagus caught two TD receptions, and Roy Nellius pulled in the other.

• Members of **Cub Pack 2**, Downingtown, who won prizes in the Halloween party costume competition, included: Blake Dorman, prettiest; Tommy Hipple, most original; and Jerry Keen, Eddie Miller, Roger Patrizio and Steve Hemberger, who were dressed as Goldilocks and the three bears.

It was known as the Viaduct Roller Flour Mill, when it was built in 1889 by E. Vinton Philips. In recent years, the building has been occupied by Bob Wagner's Mill Carpet, WeatherMaster Windows and CarQuest Auto Parts. The team of horses and wagon, carrying a replica of Downingtown's Log House in the above photo, was ready to participate in the 1909 parade, celebrating Downingtown's 50th anniversary of its incorporation as a borough. The land on which the mill was built originally was purchased in 1886 to be used as the planned site for the First Baptist Church, which ultimately was built at Manor and West Lancaster Avenues.

Brief, but important

1. Francis Taraschi, trustee at St. Anthony's Lodge, Downingtown, tells us that one of the women pictured in the Group Photo in last week's Hist-O-Gram was incorrectly identified as Schollastra DiOttavio. The woman was Mary Sperduti. Also, the spelling for Mrs. Caporale's first name is Edorinda, not Dorinda. The photo was taken on November 29, 1949, when St. Anthony was celebrating its 30th anniversary. The 25th anniversary was not celebrated due to the war; members of the Lodge waited for the war to end and the return of family members. 2. Published in the September 20, 1903 edition of the Philadelphia Inquirer: *About 1,000 persons witnessed the harness races at the formal opening of the new Kerr Racetrack at Downingtown this afternoon.* The one-half mile track was located at the intersection of Brandywine Avenue and Boot Road. Downingtown High School's football team played its home games in the track's interior field in the early 20th Century.

What was happening here 67 years ago

Noted below are news items originally published in local papers in the latter part of April 1949:

• Representatives of school boards from seven surrounding townships unanimously voted to help the Downingtown borough's school system accommodate the increasing enrollment at Downingtown Junior-Senior High School by participating in a **consolidation plan**. The plan included a \$300,000 addition to the junior-senior building, which had to be approved by neighboring township taxpayers in a referendum in the November elections. The plan also called for the establishment of a joint high school board, comprised of members from the townships as well as the borough.

• A fire of an undermined cause destroyed much of the **Fraser Feed Mill** on Reed Road in East Brandywine, which was owned and operated by John Fraser of Guthriesville.

• About 2,500 people came to the **Point-to-Point races** held on the Cann and Baldwin farms in Marshallton. Members of the Marshallton branch of the Chester County Hospital Auxiliary, who sold food at the event included Mrs. Clarence Moore, Mrs. Henry Moore, Mrs. Earl LeFevre, Mrs. Fred Hoopes, Mrs. Harry Cann, Mrs. Harvey Young, Mrs. D. Ciaffoni, Mrs. Andrew Brookover and Mary Wickersham.

• Elected to lead the **Glen Moore Improvement Society** were John Galt, president; Eleanor Bartol, vice president; Mrs. Noah Sensenig, secretary; and Niels Jensen, treasurer.

• New members of the **Downingtown Lions Club** were: William Rowland, Rev. George Bass, John Snyder, Earl Foreman, Anthony DiLuigi, Edward Peterson and Walter McClure.

• **Student-musicians from DHS**, chosen to participate in the Southeastern Pennsylvania District Music Festival held at the high school, included: Janet Kriebel, John Windle, Paul Miller, James Warnick, Everett Lang, Frank DiSilvestro, Christy Christ, Frances Mascherino, Barbara Seibert, Joseph Streamer, Joan Lenhardt, Margaret Sciaretta and Louise Bartelmo.

• Reelected as officers of the Downingtown branch of the Ladies Auxiliary of Chester County Hospital were: Mrs. Herbert Ash, president; Mrs. William Mittel, vice president; Mrs. Arthur Philips, secretary; and Mrs. Shartle Brookover, treasurer.

• Elected as officers of the **East Ward School Mothers Club** were Mrs. John Miller, president; Mrs. Ogier Norris, vice president; Mrs. Frederick Bicking, secretary; and Mrs. George Wagner, treasurer.

• New officers of the **St. Anthony's Lodge Ladies Auxiliary** were Agnes Girafalco, president; Mary Mento, vice president; Eva Taraschi, secretary; and Florence Pomento, treasurer.

• Officers elected to lead the **Junior Women's Club of Uwchlan** were Mrs. Samuel Windham, president; Mrs. Paul Otter, vice president; Mrs. Glenn Plank secretary; and Mrs. Wayne Bickel, treasurer.

• Mrs. John Hadfield was elected president of the **Downingtown Junior Woman's Club**. Also elected were Mrs. Arthur Anderson, first vice president; Mrs. Carl Engle, second vice president; Mrs. Charles Sigle, recording secretary; Mrs. Horace Miller, corresponding secretary; and Mrs. William Reed, treasurer.

• Gordon Carpenter's mound performance—six strikeouts and only one walk—helped the **DHS baseball team** beat West Chester 3-1. In the first inning, Bill Davis stole home to give the Whippets their first run. Additional runs were tallied by Ron Hogg and Johnny Talierco.

Internet site is new source of historic, local news

We recently discovered another source of historic information online, about the Downingtown area, which was originally published in newspapers many years ago.

• A new school, opened in Downingtown in 1910, which was the first building constructed solely as a public school in the borough. (Originally called the Central School, grades 1-12; it later was known as the West Ward Elementary School after the junior-senior high school—now the STEM Academy—on Manor Avenue opened in 1932). Since a referendum had determined that the school on West Lancaster Avenue would be constructed for \$60,000 and the cost ultimately was about \$58,000, the school board handed some \$2,000 back to the borough.— May 8, 1910, Philadelphia Inquirer.

• The source of much of the pollution of the Brandywine Creek in the Downingtown Borough area was determined to be **19 water closets** emptying into the streams, as well as a large quantity of refuse from a dyeing mill.—August 21, 1907, *Philadelphia Inquirer*.

• Members of the Harrisburg Motor Club were warned about a **speed trap on Route 30** in Downingtown. To inform unsuspecting motorists, a warning sign had been erected on the highway, at both ends of the borough. Those ensnared for exceeding the speed limit had to pay a total \$14.50 (about \$200 today) in fines and costs.—September 20, 1919, *Harrisburg Patriot*.

• When Camden High School defeated the DHS boys' basketball team 46-28, 1,200 fans **jammed the Downingtown Opera House** (*later the Roosevelt Theatre*), that was the largest crowd to see a basketball game in the borough.—November 24, 1908, *Philadelphia Inquirer*.

• Downingtown was known as the "New Bridgeton" by people who had worked for the Cohansey Glass Works plant in Bridgeton, NJ, which had closed, and now were employed at Cohansey's plant on Chestnut Street in Downingtown. One person claimed that at least one-third of glass workers at the Downingtown plant were former Bridgtonians.—March 10, 1908, *Bridgeton Evening News*.

• The man who had broken into the **Griffith and Wollerton Store** on East Lancaster Ave., Downingtown, in the early morning hours, was captured by a dozen neighborhood residents. They were awakened when the burglar smashed the front window to gain entry to the store. Since he couldn't escape via the rear of the store, the burglar then raced out the front door, into the arms of the posse of neighborhood men, several of whom were armed with pistols. Those packing heat, including a borough physician, started firing their weapons from all sides. Miraculously, no one was wounded or killed. —October 3, 1909, *Philadelphia Inquirer*.

• Mary Walker, of Downingtown, and her bridesmaids were all ready for her late afternoon wedding at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Downingtown, which was filled with family and friends. The appointed hour, 4 PM, came and passed, but the husband-to-be, George Coughlin, of Philadelphia, didn't show up. Rev. James O'Reilly, pastor of St. Joseph's, and the congregation waited until after 5 PM, but **Coughlin never showed up**.—May 1, 1900, *Philadelphia Inquirer*.

• When the Harrisburg's Central High School girls' basketball team came to Downingtown and was defeated by the DHS quintet of girl cagers, the visitors alleged they suffered more than a lost basketball game. One Central player allegedly was **forced to drop out** of the game, "after being knocked down four times in succession by a Downingtown girl." And almost all of the Central girls were "bruised and cut." Worse yet, claimed a Harrisburg source, the game was played on an old theatre (*the Downingtown Opera House*) floor, which was considerably lower at one end than the other.—February 23, 1914, *Harrisburg Patriot*.

Local man was model for Remington's statue, 'The Cowboy'



Jim Sundman is a truly perceptive scholar because he was the first person to correctly identify the bronze statue in the photo above as "The Cowboy," by legendary American sculptor Frederic Remington (1861-1909). Charlie Trego of Downingtown posed on site for the statue, which was sculpted in 1908. The statue—12 feet high and nearly 11-feet wide—is located on Kelly Drive in Fairmont Park in Philadelphia.

Trego (1856-1925) owned two farms in East Brandywine, where the livestock and some of the show's cast (including Annie Oakley) connected with "Buffalo Bill" Cody's Wild West Show (1883-1913) spent the winter months, after each touring season had ended. Trego had befriended Cody when he left Chester County and worked as a cowboy out west as a young men, according to a two-part series, published in the *East Branch Citizen* in 1977. The series was based on interviews of Charles Hayes, Trego's step-grandson who lived on Race Street in Downingtown, where Trego and his wife, Carrie Ash Hayes Trego, spent their late years.

But Trego became more than Cody's "best and most trusted friend" when he was hired as an advance agent for the Wild West Show, which toured all over Europe as well as the United States. In addition to arranging for the transportation of the show's 200 cast members, 97 Native Americans, 18 buffalo, 181 horses, 10 elk, 4 donkeys, 5 longhorns, 2 deer, 10 mules, and the Deadwood Concord stagecoach that crossed the Atlantic on several ships, the job also included traveling to the next city where the show was to be put on, to make arrangements for the performers' and livestock's food and lodging. The show included trick riders, sharpshooters, stampeding herds and Indian "savages." The cast also included Buck Taylor, the first "King of the Cowboys," who settled in the Lyndell area with his family after the show went out of business. Trego and his wife also helped found the town of Cody, WY, at Cody's request.

What was happening here 36 years ago

Noted below are news items retrieved from December 1980 editions of the East Branch Citizen.

• Despite some parents' threats to sue the school district, the Downingtown School Board voted not to provide **noontime school bus service for kindergarten students** who attended half-day sessions.

• **Chemical Leaman Tank Lines** moved its headquarters from East Lancaster Avenue in Downingtown to a five-story building in Pickering Creek Industrial Park in Exton. The trucking firm had 77 terminals, and was the largest tank line in the U.S.

• Recent **property transfers** included: 25 Dorothy Lane, Upper Uwchlan, \$79,225; 461 East Radnor Court, Uwchlan, \$79,900; 458 West Prospect Ave., Downingtown, \$53,060; 110 Tradition Lane, East Brandywine, \$69,900; 131 Woodland Circle, East Caln, \$73,000; 1645 Exeter Circle, West Bradford, \$51,780; 301 Edgemont Ave., Caln, \$52,700.

• Coach Bob Boyer's **boys' basketball squad** rallied in the second half, to defeat Great Valley 67-56. Art Harlow, 26 points and 15 rebounds, and Mark Redfern, 15 points and 12 rebounds, paced the Whippets' efforts. The **DHS girls' basketball team** garnered its first victory by beating O.J. Roberts 41-31. The Whippets leading scorers were Beth Beebe and Becky Connelly, who each tallied nine points. The DHS **varsity wrestling squad** won the PBM Rotary Tourney, which attracted eight teams. Individual titles were won by Sean O'Donnell, John Lucerne, Tom Urban and Glenn Koser. **DHS football players** named to the all-Ches-Mont team were Bruce Tiller, Doug Hamilton, Teddy Robinson and Chet Eagles.

• **Tom Brookover**, whose family had been involved in Downingtown's paperboard industry for 77 years, retired from Sonoco Products Co., formerly Downingtown Paper Co., after working there for 42 years.

• **Girl Scouts** in the Downingtown Service Unit baked and donated 250 one-pound coffee tins full of cookies to patients at Embreeville State Hospital in West Bradford. Each of the tins was decorated by individual scouts, and they were judged for their designs by Hilda Rath and Mary Mahan. Winners in the most original category were Kristen Staley, Karla Mixon, Rosemary Moffit, Melanie Kefer and Cathy Pfeiffer.

• Members of **Cub Pack 23**, sponsored by Central Presbyterian Church, who earned badges included Mark Ferris, Greg Morris, Alan Cockerham, David Hunt, Chris Tyson, Eddie Schroeder, Richard Wagner, Jeff Zeiders, Larry Bronson, Robbie Fuchs, Jeff Hines, Richard Huffman and Jamie Mendenhall.

• **Ebenezer Baptist Church** announced plans to build a new church on Wallace Avenue in East Caln.

News about Downingtown area found in Phila. Inquirer

Noted below are excerpts about the Downingtown area, retrieved from articles published in the *Philadelphia Inquirer*:

• A tornado struck Downingtown "with astonishing swiftness" in 1921. It blew down several frame houses and sheds, as if they were constructed of cardboard. Among the dozen people injured were three female residents and a two-year-old boy who were hospitalized, in critical condition. Severe property damage also included scores of utility poles, the Swan Hotel's porch and the roof of the Frank Miller Co. Office. *Philadelphia Inquirer, March 10, 1921*

• The **Woman's Christian Temperance Union** in Lionville had rented the barroom of the Lionville Hotel, which had not had a tavern license for several years, and used that space for its meetings. *Philadelphia Inquirer, December 21, 1894*

• An effort to prohibit part of the **Friends Meeting House in Lionville** from being used by the Uwchlan School Board for public school purposes was overruled in 1904 by the Court of Chester County. *Philadelphia Inquirer, August 25, 1904*

• Plans for the **Downingtown Opera House** (later known as the Roosevelt Theatre) on Brandywine Avenue were drawn up by a Philadelphia architect in 1902. However, the new Opera House was put up for sale in 1913. Interested parties were directed to contact Penrose Moore. *Philadelphia Inquirer, November 12, 1902* and *April 27, 1913*

• The newly chartered **Downingtown Iron Works** was expected to begin producing structural and boiler iron on April 1, 1913. Earlier plans to introduce manufacturing firms in the borough had been opposed because "there would be too much noise and bustle, and the splendor of the landscape and serenity of the lives of anti-progressives would be disturbed." *Philadelphia Inquirer, February 23, 1913*

• Several prominent Chester County farmers—including Bayard Conard and Horace Fetters, both of Upper Uwchlan—organized the Pottstown and West Chester Improvement Co. in 1903. They proposed that a **trolley line**, which went through Whitford, Lionville and Ludwigs Corner, should be built. *Philadelphia Inquirer, October 22, 1903*

• Lewis Green of Lionville was charged in 1921 with attempting to **steal a kiss** from a neighbor, Mrs. Frank Cain, who was "22 years old and pretty." Green, "also a young person and good-looking," had made attempts on several occasions to steal a kiss" from Mrs. Cain, but she had repelled him. However, when he "grasped her by the arm and threatened to kill her if she did not yield," she filed charges against Green. *Philadelphia Inquirer, September 24, 1921*

• Following an **engagement that lasted more than 40 years**, Hannah Carpenter, of Marshallton, finally married Thomas Cope, an East Bradford farmer. The groom was about 70 years old, and the bride was several years his junior. The wedding had been deferred years ago because of the failing health of the bride's mother, who had died several months ago. *Philadelphia Inquirer, June 26 1900.*

What was happening here 52 years ago

Noted below are items published in local newspapers in the latter part of November 1964:

• The Downingtown Savings and Loan Association announced that it would purchase the **Swan Hotel** property from Gene DiSantis, after the borough landmark is demolished in the spring of 1965. A committee comprised of Ray Sheeler, Edwin Baldwin, Elmer Matthews, Robert Piersol and Ellen Ann Roberts had been investigating a possible new location for the local financial institution for about 18 months.

• West Bradford residents essentially told members of the township planning commission they wanted **"to keep a few cows and bushes"** in the township, according to results of a preliminary, long-range survey conducted by a Philadelphia consulting firm. The consultants also noted that limitations imposed by transportation, water and sewerage factors "almost ruled out" heavy industry in the township.

• The highlight of the **Downingtown Chamber of Commerce's Christmas light decorations** in the business district was the addition of a 10-foot square chandelier, which was suspended from a 30-foot tall utility pole in the borough's center square.

• Patrol leaders of a new **Girl Scout troop in Eagle**, which met at Windsor Baptist Church, included Bonnie MacDougal, Jennie Werner, Margi Moore, and Judy Dewees. Brenda Hilton was the scribe, and Debbie Frank was treasurer. And girls who flew up from Brownies were Linda Dewees, Karen Gottier, Jean Simpson, Connie Robinson, Linda Garvine, Luanne Lyons, Kathy Hurst and Martha Sorenson.

• **Cub Pack 23**, sponsored by Central Presbyterian Church, Downingtown, was also newly chartered. George Hinkley was cubmaster, and Robert Sheeler was assistant cubmaster. Den mothers included Helen Brown, Lena Hinkley, Annie Steigher, Dorothy Swisher, Katie Umberger and Edith Walton.

• Mrs. John Piersol was elected president of the **East Brandywine Fire Co. Auxiliary.** Other officers were Mrs. Edgar Pierce, vice president; Mrs. Robert McCarty, recording secretary; Helen Laird, secretary; Mrs. Jay Lammey, treasurer; and Mrs. Hannah Harner, chaplain.

• Dorothy Collins, Robin Fowler, Dorothea Myers and Sheryl Klewer were invested into **Junior Girl Scout Troop 148 in Marshallton**. Leaders of the troop were Mrs. Richard Bedsworth, Mrs. Vernon Harper and Mrs. Robert Myers.

• **Marshallton School** students, who were instrumental students of Miss Josephine Volpe, included William Keeler, Tony Amoriello, Cathy Busby, Jeffrey Sharp, James McGeehan, David Christy, Barbara Griggs, Marybeth Grigson and Raymond Hagele.

• The Chester County Chapter of the DAR placed a brass plaque near the front door of the **Uwchlan Friends Meeting** in Lionville. The historical marker noted that the Meeting House had been used as a military hospital during the American Revolutionary War.

It's the Minquas Fire Company



Gregg Nelms is a truly perceptive scholar because he was the first person to correctly identify the site in the photo above as the Minquas Fire Co., when it was on East Lancaster Avenue in Downingtown. As Bob Lee informed us, the scaffolding on the right side of the firehouse probably was used to construct a tower where wet fire hoses were hung to dry. And according to Charles Pennypacker's 1909 "History of Downingtown," the Minquas Fire Co., was incorporated in 1906. The firehouse was dedicated as part of the 50th anniversary celebration of Downingtown's incorporation as a borough in 1909. At that time, there were 280 members. We were unable to find any information about Downingtown's Brandywine Band. The photo, provided by Mike Miller of the Minquas Fire Co., was taken by William South, legendary Downingtown photographer.
