Downingtown's Josephus Miller Dies From Civil War Wounds (34 Years After the Battle)


On September 5, 1863, Josephus Miller, an African-American man, traveled from his home in West Fallowfield Township where he lived with his wife Alice, to West Chester to enlist in the 8th United States Colored Infantry. Miller was born in Maryland around 1825. Whether he was born into slavery in the South is not known.

At the recruiting office in West Chester, which was one of several in the Philadelphia area for this Regiment, Miller joined Company D. The recruiting officer was a Captain Christmas. Later that month Miller went to Camp William Penn in what is now Cheltenham Township just outside of Philadelphia, where the regiment was being organized and trained. In January 1864, the 8th left Philadelphia for Hilton Head, South Carolina, and in February the unit became part of a Union expedition to Florida sent to disrupt Confederate food supplies coming from that state. Miller, however, was ill and stayed behind in a Hilton Head army hospital.

When the 8th arrived in Florida they spent several days in Jacksonville, then marched west into the center of the state. At first, the brigade which included the 8th faced little resistance, and against orders, continued across Florida in order to capture the state capital of Tallahassee. But reinforced Confederate troops met them near the small town of Olustee where the Union troops were repulsed and driven back to Jacksonville. Dozens of men in Miller's regiment were killed or wounded.



The 8th remained in Jacksonville until early April and during that time a recuperated Miller rejoined his fellow soldiers. The regiment then moved a short distance east of the city to St. John's Bluff where they remained for most of the hot summer of 1864. In August, the 8th was transferred north to Virginia near Petersburg, and in late September fought in the Battle of Chaffin's Farm (also called Laurel Hill). Here, on September 29, 1864, Josephus Miller was shot three times in the chest. He was taken to a field hospital, but Army surgeons were unable to find the musket balls inside his body. The wounds were closed with the balls remaining inside. Miller was eventually sent to De Camp General Hospital on Davids Island in New York Harbor where, over the following months, he recovered from his chest wounds. Partially disabled soldiers, such as those in Miller's condition, were often sent to the Veteran Reserve Corps for the remainder of their enlistments where they would perform garrison or other light duty, freeing able-bodied soldiers to serve on the front lines. But on Miller's discharge certificate it was noted that "being a negro he is not a subject for the Veteran Reserve Corps." As a result, Josephus Miller was discharged from the Union Army on January 3, 1865 and returned to Chester County. He carried home inside of him the three confederate musket balls.

Miller returned home to his wife Alice in East Fallowfield where he worked as a farm hand. Sometime in the 1870s the couple moved to Downingtown. In the 1880 Census the Miller's were living on Church Street. Josephus' occupation was a 'fence maker.' He and Alice lived in or near Downingtown for the rest of his life. Miller was very active in the Grand Army of the Republic George F. Smith Post. This post in West Chester was comprised of former African-American soldiers.

The Confederate musket balls caused Miller considerable pain and trouble throughout his life. But in October 1898 the pain worsened, and he became very sick. He died at home on November 2, 1898. He was buried in Chestnut Grove Cemetery in West Chester.

In The (Old) News – Items that Made Headlines Back in the Day

1879 – Frank Clayton of Marshallton in West Bradford Township was one of the areas best hunters who kept a large number of fox hounds. During a February hunt, Clayton and his dogs chased a fox for four hours before he gave up. The hounds, however, didn't heed the call to stop and continued the pursuit. Of his 18 dogs, only five returned. It was not known if the missing 13 ever came back.

1911 – In July, two Downingtown boys were arrested after breaking into and stealing goods from a Pennsylvania Railroad boxcar. However, railroad officials agreed to drop the charges if the boys' parents paid for the stolen items.

1931 – According to a newspaper article "a wild mallard duck with a steel trap attached to its leg has been seen flying over Beaver Creek, near Downingtown, PA. The bird, apparently, is not handicapped in flying."

1942 – On May 5, a truck carrying 6,000 gallons of gasoline overturned on Lancaster Avenue in the center of Downingtown, spilling its contents over a two-block area. The accident occurred at 5:45 AM when the driver, Charles Taggart of Philadelphia, slammed on his brakes causing the truck to overturn. The gasoline caught fire and destroyed telephone polls and damaged the roadway. The gasoline also drained into sewers resulting in several small explosions. Taggart, who was driving the truck to Philadelphia from Lebanon, escaped injury. No homes or businesses were damaged.

Downingtown Historical Commission Holiday Specials


Our friends at the Downingtown Historic Commission have several items for sale for the upcoming holidays...




Log House Mugs - \$8



Downingtown Vintage Ad



Here is a receipt for ten horseshoes purchased by Edge Lewis from Jacob Mittel in January and February 1906. Mittel operated a horse shoeing and blacksmith shop on the west side of Downingtown. Lewis paid the \$3.93 bill on March 7 of that year.
